COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

Course

Description

Iowa State University
Individual & Family Life
Development

An introductory undergraduate course, designed to provide a theoretical and practical understanding of the social and psychological factors that influence interpersonal relationships within the institution of marriage and the family as well as patterns of human growth and developmental change from conception until death.

Family Interaction Dynamics

An upper-level undergraduate structured course, designed to provide undergraduates a theoretical and practical understanding of the interactions of family members over time and across generations. This course is also taught as a graduate course alternating spring semesters.

Adolescent Development

A graduate course, which addresses patterns of human growth and developmental change from late childhood through the early adulthood years within a biopsychosocial perspective. Emphasis is placed on policy and practice. This course is taught alternating spring semesters.

Northwestern University
Child and Adolescent
Development

An interdisciplinary undergraduate core course, which focuses on patterns of human growth and developmental change from conception until young adulthood are addressed within a psychosocial perspective. Particular emphasis was placed on the relationship between developmental research and policy-making.

The Ohio State University
Family Development

An undergraduate course designed to provide a theoretical and practical understanding of the social and psychological factors that influence interpersonal relationships within the institution of marriage and the family.

Lifespan Development

An interdisciplinary undergraduate course, which focused on patterns of human growth and developmental change from conception until death within a psychosocial perspective.

Adolescent Development

An upper-level undergraduate/graduate interdisciplinary course, which addressed patterns of human growth and developmental change from late childhood through the early adulthood years within a biopsychosocial perspective.

Family, School, and
Community Contexts:
Grade 9

A newly designed grant-supported upper level undergraduate/graduate service-learning course which examined developmental issues faced by adolescents and families in the transition to high school. It includes a technological emphasis together with website development and an applied research focus through parent and adolescent workshops.
